Participants in the five week SUM program can be guided to the games that match each child's ability. Parents will also learn games that will be the next steps, or easier versions that may be more suited to younger siblings. The program's goal is to reduce regression of math skills over the summer. Each week families will learn different math games appropriate for each child's math skills and each grade level. All materials used in the donated by participating teachers for their time to plan games are provided to each family so they can continue to play the math games at home. Participating families are required to be provided prior to each session, local school districts, and register in advance for each week so that enough meals and

Selections show people, locations, buildings, and events of historic note.

Pictures used in the mural date from 1885 to 2009. Several other tiles list the county's various cities and towns, a chronology of the county's economic growth, political history, education and other information.

## **SUM Summer Fun Family** Program Builds Math Skills

Children entering grades K-5 this fall and their families will learn games to help the children retain and improve their math skills over the summer. Different games, all built around math skills and following a developmental continuum, will be taught at each session of SUM Summer Fun from early June through mid-July through a Friends' grant. Data from both Danville Independent Schools and Boyle County Schools show that the percentage of children entering kindergarten who have the foundation needed for kindergaten academics is below the state average of 25%. Only 15.2%

of Danville students and 18.3% of Boyle students are kindergarten ready when they enter kindergarten.

Math\_teachers Suzanne Farmer, 5 Becky Fuqua, Betty Jo Davis and Helen Blevins designed the pro-gram and will lead the summer 6 7 sessions. This group has offered


## A Note from Friends' President A HISTORIC TIME AT THE LIBRARY

April 24, 2013 was a historic day for Friends of the Library. At 3:30 pm Karl Benson, Library Director, and staffer Mary Girard unveiled the Historic Boyle County Mural. This mural was made possible by the Friends of the Library. Thank You! Earlier in the day, I represented the Friends at the Kentucky Writers' Day induction of Danville native, Frank X Walker, as the 2013-14 Kentucky Poet Laureate. In his Poet Laureate Address. Walker spoke of how im-

portant the Boyle County Public Library had been to him as a young boy. As Friends of the Library members, the thing we hold in common is our appreciation of the important place that libraries hold in our communities. Libraries are places where our collective community memory is held. But more, the library is a place where our imaginations are free to take flight and explore all the different worlds beyond our own community, country, time and space.

In the space between the unveiling of the mural and the Friends sponsored Audubon in Kentucky program by Sarah Vahlkamp, I walked into the courtyard. Those of us who love libraries also appreciate the foundational silence of the library. The courtyard is one of the libraries' magic outdoor reading spaces - - spaces where one can walk among the words. The steady, spring rain had stopped, and the colors of the flowers were bright in their post rain glow. I lingered and read the names and quotes on the brick circle. Midway around I saw: *"I would not be a writer today if the library had* not fed my hunger to discover new worlds." -- Frank X Walker


# **Library Offers Summer Reading** & Activities for All Ages

# Frank X Walker, New Kentucky Poet Laureate, Visits Library

Danville's own Frank X Walker was inducted as Kentucky's new Poet Laureate on April 24th. Several Friends of the Library members and other local residents attended the occasion. A published poet and playwright, Walker is a University of Kentucky associate professor of English and director of the African American and Africana Studies Program. As state Poet Laureate Walker will promote the collective excellence of Kentucky writers and the conributions they have made to American literature. As Gov. Steve Breshear noted at the induction, Walker is both the youngest ever. and the first African American to serve as Kentucky Poet Laureate.

As a child growing up in Danville, Walker was a regular Boyle County Public Library patron, he recalled, during a recent trip to Danville to visit the library and to meet with a class of students at Danville Montessori School. That day Walker fulfilled a childhood dream and drove the library's bookmobile! To prepare for that experience Walker first met with bookmobile staff and toured the bookmobile room at the library. There he saw bookmobile route lists and route schedules posted for the staff to follow, hundreds of books and other library material on shelves being held to fulfill requests of individual bookmobile patrons. Walker checked bookmobile routes to find the route

that brought books to him where he lived as a child.

Walker learned that the Boyle County Public Library is one of very few in the state that continues to provide a full service bookmobile for patrons throughout the county. Patrons themselves enter the bookmobile, look through books displayed and select the books they check out, and visit with bookmobile staff with whom they form supportive relationships and true friendships. Patrons also can request particular titles, periodicals or other media from the library's inventory to be delivered to them on the next visit.

Staff explained that the majority of Kentucky libraries, if they still have bookmobiles, have switched


The library formed a partnership with the Arts Commission earlier this year to further its commitment to enriching the lives of its patrons. The ville and Boyle County to experience the arts, and to offer local art-

lery. This is the second exhibit arranged through a partnership with the Arts Commission of Danville/Boyle County. The Arts Commission exists to provide opportunities for residents of Danists opportunites to exhibit their work in spaces open to the public. The library joins other locations in the county in donating space for art displays. Ann Nichols, director of the Arts Commission, was delighted that the library has made the Mahan Gallery available for public art exhibits.

The first exhibit through the partnership "SpringScene" was held earlier in the spring and featured mixed media works of five local artists. Pieces on display included oil, watercolor, photography, floral arrangement, fiber art, woodworking, sculpture, relflective collage and a computer designed print. Numerous art pieces from the library's own art collection of about 250 items is permanently displayed throughout the library spaces.

to smaller vehicles with only "drop off" service. This service delivers pre-selected materials to patrons' homes, but no longer offers the same on-board total experience of perusing available books and picking out titles that patrons then check out.

Bookmobile staff are proud of the library's 30-year tradition of full bookmobile service to their patrons. Regular patrons include home schoolers, senior citizens residing in their own homes as well as those who reside in Arnold Towers, many children and families in neighborhoolds and smaller Boyle County communities, other group housing sites, and many recovering from surgery, illness or accident who use they bookmobile until they can get to the library on their own again.

## BENSON, LIBRARY DIRECTOR FOR 35 YEARS, RETIRES

Board President Betsy Wilt presided at a retirement reception held at the library on May 30th to honor Karl Benson for his outstanding vision, dedication and leadership as the library's director for the past 35 years. Benson officially retired May 31st.

A large crowd of local patrons, friends, current and former library employees, current and past library board members, and special guests gathered for the event.

Special guests attending were Senator Tom Buford, glass artist Stephen Powell, architect Josh Ives of Pearson & Peters Architects, Kentucky State Library Commissioner Wayne Onkst, Boyle County Judge Executive Harold McKinney, and Danville Mayor Bernie Hunstad. All have worked closely with Benson during his tenure and recognized his many efforts to grow and improve the

Boyle County Public Library facility, its collections, and technology during his tenure, and for his work with other state public librarians.

McKinney shared a proclamation of the Boyle Co. Fiscal Court naming Friday May 31st "Karl Benson Day." Powell presented Benson with "the last piece of "*Time Zippy*", the glass sculpture in the rotunda -- a red globe like the lowest, central one in the sculpture.

Wilt noted that Benson made certain that the library reflects Danville and Boyle County through work of local artists and touches of local history incorporated in the library building, as well as the broader world with details like the Star Dome in the children's library, the large revolving globe upstairs, and the compass rose mosaic in the entrance's floor.

Reception guests visit within library's spaces. She stressed that Benson has been a "public servant" in the best

sense of the term to the library, its patrons, his staff and boards, and the taxpayers. Library board members renamed the new car park as the Karl Benson Library Park in tribute to him.

Margaret Levi, on behalf of the library board members, presented a retirement gift made possible from individual contributions from board members and other individuals to assist Benson with his love of travel.

Benson expressed his appreciation to all whose help has contributed to the library's success. He said that he plans to remain in the area and hopes to continue to travel, perhaps to New Delhi, India, among other destinations, as that has been a lifelong dream.
