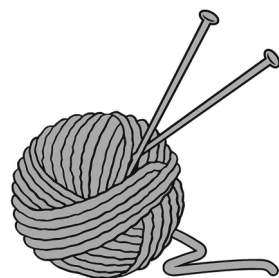


Crafters Who Care meet every Monday from 6 to 8 pm at the Boyle County Public Library.

Photographic media are sensitive materials that require special housing to ensure their longevity. This webinar, held in the conference room at the Boyle County Public Library on January 17th at 2 pm, will examine suitable housing supplies, including paper, plastics, boxes, and more. Safe handling of photographs will also be discussed.

Pee Wee Reese, Baseball Great

Dick Usher, a Chautauqua speaker, will be presenting "Pee Wee Reese, Baseball Great" on Thursday, January 25th at 5 pm. The program is sponsored by the Kentucky Humanities Council, Inc. This is something baseball fans and non-fans alike should enjoy!



"Harold Henry Reese got his famous nickname Pee Wee from a marble he used when he was a boy. The name fit because he turned out to be a man of modest stature, but by every measure you could apply to an athlete — teamwork, leadership, determination, winning, grace under pressure — Pee Wee Reese was a giant. Born in Meade County, Kentucky, Reese grew up in Louisville. At 19, he quit his job at the telephone company to play professional baseball for the Louisville Colonels. By 1940, he was playing for the Brooklyn Dodgers. As captain, shortstop, and lead-off man, he led the Dodgers to seven pennants and, in 1955, a World Series win. Inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1984, his plaque there also records the powerful example he set when Jackie Robinson joined the Dodgers in 1947 as the major leagues' first black player. Reese's acceptance and support of Robinson were instrumental in breaking down baseball's color barrier."

Another Warm Welcome to New Staff

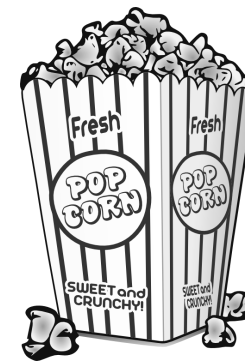

Thursday, March 22nd at 7:00 pm

Directed by Vincent Minnelli, starring Judy Garland. In the year leading up to 1904 World's Fair, the four Smith daughters learn lessons of life and love as they prepare for a reluctant move to New York.

Double Indemnity (1944)

Thursday, March 29th at 7:00 pm

Directed by Billy Wilder, starring Fred MacMurray and Barbara Stanwyck. A platinum blonde and an insurance salesman concoct a plot to do away with her husband.

Scarface (1932)

Thursday, April 5th at 7:00 pm

Directed by Howard Hawkes, starring Paul Muni. An ambitious gangster climbs the ladder of success in the mob, but his weaknesses prove to be his downfall.

Paths to Glory (1957)

Thursday, April 12th at 7:00 pm

Directed by Stanley Kubrick, starring Kirk Douglas. After refusing to attack an enemy position, a general accuses the soldiers of cowardice, and their commanding officer must defend them.

The Manchurian Candidate (1966)

Thursday, April 19th at 7:00 pm

Directed by John Frankenheimer, starring Frank Sinatra and Janet Leigh. An American soldier is brainwashed by Cold War villains.

Chariots of Fire (1980)

Thursday, April 26th at 7:00 pm

Directed by Hugh Hudson, starring Ben Cross. Two British track athletes, one a determined Jew and the other a devout Christian, compete in the 1924 Olympics.

Bernheim Forest Manager to Speak

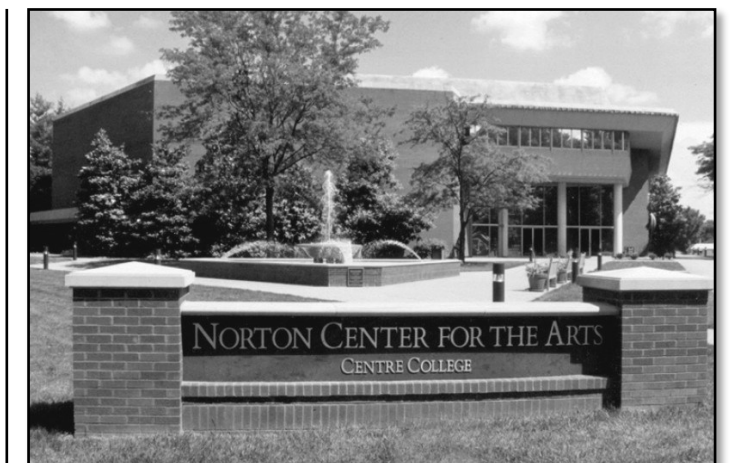
Want to learn more about our local forests and what roles a forest manager plays in them? This may be the program for you.

Bernheim Forest is south of Louisville and is used for natural research and also holds nature programs and annual festivals.

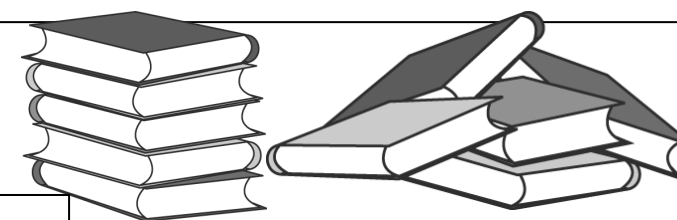


A Backstage Tour
