The Boyle County Public Library is celebrating the life and works of Jane Austen. There are films, lectures, book discussions and TEA with JANE!


Jane Austen (1775 - 1817) is one of the most influential English authors in the world.






Children love animals, even the ones they think are a little scary! Animal Tales brought in exotic animals to show, and even let the audience not just watch but interact.

## Director's Choice Movie Series



The Fall film series will be a little different this Fall. The series is usually organized around a film genre (comedy or mystery), a period (1930's), or a topic (race relations, politics). This fall there will be a variety of films including a musical, a western, a comedy, a romance and various dramas.

The unifying factor is that each of the films is directed by a director whose works have been the highest rated according to Andrew Sarris and other critics and film historians. Hence, we find Hawks, Ford, Hitchcock, Welles, et al. in our upcoming series. Also it is interesting to note that two of the films in the series have Kentucky connections.

Sept 21, 2017 - She Wore a Yellow Ribbon (1949) - Captain Nathan Brittles, on the eve of retirement, takes out one last patrol to stop an impending Indian attack. Encumbered by women who must be evacuated, Brittles finds his mission imperiled..

Sept. 28, 2017 - All About Eve (1950) - An ingénue insinuates herself into the company of an established but aging actress and her friends.

October 5, 2017 - Ace in the Hole (1951) - A frustrated former big city journalist now still working for an Albuquerque newspaper exploits a story about a man trapped in a cave to re-jump start his career, but the situation quickly accelerates into an out-of-control circus.

October 12, 2017 - Gentlemen Prefer Blondes (1953) - Showgirls travel to Paris pursued by a private detective hired by the father of one of the showgirl's fiancé.

Oct. 19, 2017 - The Trouble With Harry (1955) - A macabre comedy about the manic efforts of a group of Vermont residents to dispatch a dead body that refuses to stay buried.

Oct. 26, 2017 - Touch of Evil (1958) - A sleazy corrupt police official in a squalid town on the Mexican border matches wits with a visitor.

Nov. 2, 2017 - Cookie's Fortune (1999) - Conflict arises in a small town when an old woman's death causes a variety of reactions among family and friends.

Nov. 9, 2017 - Midnight in Paris (2011) - While on a trip to Paris with his fiancé's family, a screenwriter finds himself mysteriously going back to the 1920's every day at midnight.

The films will be shown in the Community room at the Boyle County Public Library on Thursday nights at 7:00, with brief remarks by Charles Vahlkamp, professor emeritus of Centre College.
